103 NON-DISCRIMINATION/TITLE IX SEXUAL HARASSMENT AFFECTING STUDENTS

A. AUTHORITY

- 1. The Board declares it to be the policy of this Intermediate Unit to provide an equal opportunity for all students to achieve their maximum potential through the programs and activities offered in the schools without discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, ancestry, national origin, marital status, pregnancy or handicap/disability.
- 2. The Board also declares it to be the policy of this Intermediate Unit to comply with federal law and regulations under Title IX prohibiting sexual harassment, which is a form of unlawful discrimination on the basis of sex. Such discrimination shall be referred to throughout this policy as Title IX sexual harassment. Inquiries regarding the application of Title IX to the Intermediate Unit may be referred to the Title IX Coordinator (Students), to the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights of the U.S. Department of Education, or both.
- 3. The Intermediate Unit is committed to the maintenance of a safe, positive learning environment for all students that is free from discrimination by providing all students course offerings, counseling, assistance, services, employment, athletics and extracurricular activities without any form of discrimination, including Title IX sexual harassment. Discrimination is inconsistent with the rights of students and the educational and programmatic goals of the Intermediate Unit and is prohibited at or, in the course of, Intermediate Unit-sponsored programs or activities, including transportation to or from school or school-sponsored activities.
- 4. The Board directs that the foregoing statement of Board policy be included in each student handbook, and that this policy be posted to the Intermediate Unit's website.
- 5. The Board requires a notice stating that the Intermediate Unit does not discriminate in any manner, including Title IX sexual harassment, in any Intermediate Unit education program or activity, to be issued to all students, parents/guardians, employment applicants, employees and all unions or professional organizations holding collective bargaining or professional agreements with the Intermediate Unit. All discrimination notices and information shall include the title, office address, telephone number and email address of the individual(s) designated as the Compliance Officer (Students). and Title IX Coordinator (Students).

B. REPORTS OF TITLE IX SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND OTHER DISCRIMINATION AND RETALIATION

1. The Board encourages students and third parties who believe they or others have been subject to Title IX sexual harassment, other discrimination or retaliation to promptly report such incidents to the building administrator or program supervisor, even if some elements of the related incident took

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- place or originated away from school grounds, school activities or school conveyances. A person who is not an intended victim or target of discrimination but is adversely affected by the offensive conduct may file a report of discrimination.
 - 2. The student's parents/guardians or any other person with knowledge of conduct that may violate this policy is encouraged to immediately report the matter to the building administrator or program supervisor.
 - 3. A school employee who suspects or is notified that a student has been subject to conduct that constitutes a violation of this policy shall immediately report the incident to the building administrator or program supervisor, as well as properly making any mandatory police or child protective services reports required by law.
 - 4. If the building administrator or program supervisor is the subject of a complaint, the student, third party or a reporting employee shall report the incident directly to the Title IX Coordinator (Students).
 - 5. The complainant or the individual making the report may use the Discrimination/Sexual Harassment/Bullying/Hazing/Dating Violence/Retaliation Report Form for purposes of reporting an incident or incidents in writing; however, verbal reports of an incident or incidents shall be accepted, documented and CLIU procedures followed.
 - 6. The building administrator or program supervisor shall promptly notify the Title IX Coordinator (Students) of all reports of discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment or retaliation. The Title IX Coordinator (Students) shall promptly contact the complainant regarding the report to gather additional information as necessary, and to discuss the availability of supportive measures. The Title IX Coordinator (Students) shall consider the complainant's wishes with respect to supportive measures.
 - 7. The Title IX Coordinator(Students) shall conduct an assessment to determine whether the reported circumstances are most appropriately addressed through the Discrimination Complaint Procedures prescribed, or if the reported circumstances meet the definition of Title IX sexual harassment and are most appropriately addressed through the Title IX Sexual Harassment Procedures and Review Process for Formal Complaints, or other Board policies.

C. DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES WHEN REPORTS ALLEGE TITLE IX SEXUAL HARASSMENT

1. When a report alleges Title IX sexual harassment, disciplinary sanctions may not be imposed until the completion of the review process for formal complaints. The Intermediate Unit shall presume that the respondent is not responsible for the alleged conduct until a determination has been made at the completion of the review process for formal complaints.

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- 2. When an emergency removal is warranted to address an immediate threat to the physical health or safety of an individual, and it is not feasible to continue educational services remotely or in an alternative setting, the normal procedures for suspension and expulsion shall be conducted to accomplish the removal, including specific provisions to address a student with a disability where applicable.
 - 3. When an emergency removal is not required, disciplinary sanctions shall be considered in the course of the Title IX review process for formal complaints. Following the issuance of the written determination and any applicable appeal, any disciplinary action specified in the written determination or appeal decision shall be implemented in accordance with the normal procedures for suspensions, expulsions or other disciplinary actions, including specific provisions to address a student with a disability where applicable.

D. CONFIDENTIALITY

1. Confidentiality of all parties, witnesses, the allegations, the filing of a report, and the investigation related to any form of discrimination or retaliation, including Title IX sexual harassment, shall be handled in accordance with applicable law, regulations, this policy, CLIU Procedures and the Intermediate Unit's legal and investigative obligations.

E. RETALIATION

- 1. The Board prohibits retaliation by the Intermediate Unit or any other person against any person for:
 - a. Reporting or making a formal complaint of any form of discrimination or retaliation, including Title IX sexual harassment.
 - b. Testifying, assisting, participating or refusing to participate in a related investigation, process or other proceeding or hearing.
- The Intermediate Unit, its employees and others are prohibited from intimidating, threatening, coercing, or discriminating against anyone for actions described above. Individuals are encouraged to contact the Title IX Coordinator (Students) immediately if they believe retaliation has occurred.

F. DEFINITIONS

- 1. Complainant shall mean an individual who is alleged to be the victim.
- 103 2. Respondent shall mean an individual alleged to be the perpetrator of the discriminatory conduct.

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G. DISCRIMINATION

- 1. Discrimination shall mean to treat individuals differently, or to harass or victimize based on a protected classification including race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, ancestry, national origin, marital status, pregnancy, or handicap/disability.
- 2. Harassment is a form of discrimination based on the protected classifications listed in this policy consisting of unwelcome conduct such as graphic, written, electronic, verbal or nonverbal acts including offensive jokes, slurs, epithets and name-calling, ridicule or mockery, insults or putdowns, offensive objects or pictures, physical assaults or threats, intimidation, or other conduct that may be harmful or humiliating or interfere with a person's school or school-related performance when such conduct is:
 - a. Sufficiently severe, persistent or pervasive; and
 - b. A reasonable person in the complainant's position would find that it creates an intimidating, threatening or abusive educational environment such that it deprives or adversely interferes with or limits an individual or group of the ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities or opportunities offered by a school.

H. DEFINITIONS RELATED TO TITLE IX SEXUAL HARASSMENT

- 1. Formal complaint shall mean a document filed by a complainant or signed by the Title IX Coordinator (Students) alleging Title IX sexual harassment and requesting that the Intermediate Unit investigate the allegation under the grievance process for formal complaints. The authority for the Title IX Coordinator (Students) to sign a formal complaint does not make the Title IX Coordinator (Students) a party in the grievance process for formal complaints. The phrase "document filed by a complainant" refers to a document or electronic submission that contains the complainant's physical or digital signature, or otherwise indicates that the complainant is the person filing the formal complaint.
- 2. Supportive measures shall mean nondisciplinary, nonpunitive individualized services offered as appropriate, as reasonably available, and without fee or charge to the complainant or the respondent before or after the filing of a formal complaint or where no formal complaint has been filed.

Supportive measures shall be designed to restore or preserve equal access to the educational program or activity without unreasonably burdening the other party, including measures designed to protect the safety of all parties or the educational environment, or to deter sexual harassment. Supportive measures may include, but are not limited to:
 - i. Counseling.
 - ii. Extensions of deadlines or other course-related adjustments.

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- 1. A student who is determined to be responsible for violation of this policy shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action consistent with the Code of Student Conduct, which may include but is not limited to:
 - a. Loss of school privileges.
- b. Permanent transfer to another school building, classroom or school bus.
- 248 c. Exclusion from school-sponsored activities.
- d. Detention.

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- e. Suspension.
- 251 f. Expulsion.
- 252 g. Referral to law enforcement officials.

L. REPORTS OF DISCRIMINATION

1. Any reports of discrimination that are reviewed by the Title IX Coordinator (Students) and do not meet the definition of Title IX sexual harassment but are based on race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, ancestry, genetic information, national origin, marital status, pregnancy or handicap/disability shall follow the Intermediate Unit's Complaint Procedures established by the Title IX Coordinator (Students).

M. REPORTS OF TITLE IX SEXUAL HARASSMENT

1. Any reports deemed by the Title IX Coordinator (Students) to meet the definition of sexual harassment under Title IX shall follow the Title IX Sexual Harassment Procedures and Review Process established by the Title IX Coordinator (Students).
